Breeding programme of the Shetland Pony Stud-Book Society

Stud Book of the Society

The Shetland Pony Stud-Book Society (SPS-BS) holds the stud-book of origin for the breed of Shetland ponies. It has had the same format since 1890 (eighteen hundred and ninety). In 1992 the Society gained official recognition as the stud-book of origin for the breed of Shetland ponies throughout the world

The Shetland Pony Stud-Book Society maintains and publishes a stud-book of registrations for the pedigree of Shetland ponies.

Breed Characteristics

The UK Shetland Pony Stud-Book Society sets the breed standard for registered Shetland ponies world-wide.

Breed Description

Height - Registered stock must not exceed 42 inches (107cm). Ponies are measured from the withers to the ground, by measuring stick, and a level stance, preferably concrete, should be used.

Colour - Shetland ponies may be any colour known in horses except spotted.

Coat - A double coat in winter with guard hairs which shed the rain and keep the pony's skin completely dry in the worst of the weather and, in summer a short coat which should carry a beautiful silky sheen. At all times the mane and tail hair should be long, straight and profuse.

Head - The head should be small, and in proportion. Ears should be small and erect, wide set but pointing well forward. Forehead should be broad with bold, dark, intelligent eyes. Muzzle must be broad with nostrils wide and open. Teeth and jaw must be correct.

Body - The neck should be properly set onto the shoulder, which in turn should be sloping, not upright, and end in a well-defined wither. The body should be strong, with plenty of heart room, well sprung ribs, the loin strong and muscular. The quarters should be broad and long with the tail set well up on them.

Forelegs - These should have good, flat bone. Strong forearm. Short balanced cannon bone. Springy pasterns.

Hindlegs - The thighs should be strong and muscular with well-shaped strong hocks. When viewed from behind, the hindlegs should not be set too widely apart, nor should the hocks be turned in.

Feet - Tough, round and well-shaped.

Action - Straight, free action using every joint. Tracking up well.

<u>General</u>

A most salient and essential feature of the Shetland pony is its general air of vitality (presence), stamina and robustness.

Aims of the breeding programme

The aims of the Shetland Pony Stud-Book Society are:

- i. To maintain unimpaired the purity of the breed of Shetland ponies; and
- ii. To promote, preserve and improve the breed of Shetland ponies.

Geographical territory and breeding population

The Shetland Pony Stud-Book Society operates throughout the United Kingdom.

Population of breeding animals

There are approximately 110,000 breeding animals and the United Kingdom represents approximately 38% of this total. There are approximately 600 breeders in the UK.

System for Identifying Breeding Animals

- i. Outline diagrams must be completed by the breeder or a veterinary surgeon.
- ii. All ponies when registered must have a microchip inserted by a veterinary surgeon.
- iii. All ponies are named when first registered as foals. Ponies can be named using a breeder's prefix or suffix. A prefix or suffix that is registered for use with one breeder may not be used by another breeder, without written consent from the prefix or suffix owner.
- iv. All ponies when registered are issued with a lifetime identification document.
- v. Ponies are identified by a fifteen-digit Universal Equine Life Number (UELN).

 The UELN remains the unique identification number of the pony for its life.
- vi. Where the mare owner was not also the stallion owner when the mare was covered, then a stinting certificate is required from the stallion owner to confirm covering has taken place. Where no signature can be obtained, DNA testing of the foal against its sire is required before registration.

Registration of Animals and Recording pedigrees.

Rules of entry for Registration of Pedigree Shetland Ponies in the Shetland Pony Stud-Book Society Mother Stud-Book (Stud-Book of origin) are:

- i. All pedigree Shetland ponies, whose sire and dam are already registered in the SPS-BS Mother Stud-Book, have a legal right of entry into the main body of the Mother Stud-Book. The Society will enter into the breeding book, animals of the same breed that are eligible for entry under the Society's breed criteria, without discrimination on account of their country of origin;
- ii. All foals must be registered within twelve months of their birth. Any pedigree Shetland pony, who has missed the twelve month deadline for registration, may still be registered by the Breeder but will incur additional registration fees and will have to prove parentage with full DNA parentage testing, paid for in full by the breeder at the correct fee in place at that time. The Shetland pony over twelve months old will need to have its own DNA compared to that of its Sire and Dam. Only once DNA has been provided and parentage proven will the pony be accepted for entry into the Stud-Book;
- iii. The breeder is the only person who can register a pedigree foal;
- iv. The breeder applies to the SPS-BS and must complete a registration application form and lodges this form together with the correct fee at the office of the SPS-BS. Any Identification Rules (the "Identification Rules") in force at the time of application must be met by the breeder of the foal/pony. The Identification Rules may be amended by a resolution of the Board of Directors (as constituted from time to time) of the Society (passed by simple majority by the Board of Directors);
- v. The Sire and Dam must already be registered in the main body of the Shetland Pony Stud-Book;
- vi. No pony shall be accepted for registration whose sire and dam are not already entered in the Stud-Book of an officially recognised Shetland pony Stud-Book, recognised as a Daughter (Filial) Stud-Book either by the Mother Stud-Book

- (SPS-BS) who is the Stud-Book of origin of the breed of Shetland ponies or as recognised by the legislation of the European Union;
- vii. All Shetland ponies that are registered in the main body of the SPS-BS Mother Stud-Book will have full rights and privileges of a breeding animals and have no restrictions placed upon them;
- viii. The rules of registration for pedigree Shetland ponies cannot be changed, altered or added to, or amended other than by special resolution of the members of the Society passed at a lawfully convened General Meeting at which at least 40% of the members of the Society are present in person, or except as specifically set out in Paragraph iv of these rules;
- ix. The pedigree of all ponies, to be entered and registered within the SPSBS studbook, must be shown to trace back to the stud-book of origin. No pony will be accepted unless the pedigree is proven to the satisfaction of the SPSBS.
- x. Any pony being transferred out-with the UK must be registered in the name of the seller/vendor, whose signature must be obtained before any transfer can be recorded;
- xi. Any pony being exported from the UK must have an International Pony Movement Certificate (IPMC) completed by both a veterinary surgeon, who verifies the identification of the pony, and the registered owner. A zootechnical certificate will also accompany the animal.

Breeding objectives and selection

The Society's breeding objectives are to maintain unimpaired the purity of the breed of Shetland ponies.

Selection of breeding animals

Animals are selected by owners to be registered in the Stud-Book. Any registered pedigree Shetland Pony can be selected for breeding.

Performance Testing and Genetic Evaluation

The SPS-BS does not undertake performance testing or genetic evaluation.

DNA testing is carried out on all colts passing the Voluntary Vetting Examination for stallion licensing. All colts born 2017 onwards need to be parentage tested against both parents before being licensed as stallions.

All foals must have a DNA profile of the sire completed prior to registration for the purposes of parentage verification.

Division of Herd Book

All Shetland ponies that are registered in the main body of the SPS-BS Mother Stud-Book Society will have full rights and privileges of a breeding animal and have no restrictions placed upon them.

The SPS-BS Mother Stud-Book for the origin of the breed of Shetland ponies is comprised of a main section, broken down into four classes. There are no supplementary sections and the grading-up of non pure-bred ponies is not permitted in this closed Stud-Book. The Stud-Book is set out as below:

- Main body, pedigree foal register for all foals, (one pedigree foal register only in the main body of the studbook, where <u>all</u> pedigree Shetland foals are recorded, no restrictions at all placed on any foal);
- ii. Main body, pedigree mare register for all pedigree mares producing a first foal, (one pedigree mare register only in the main body of the Stud-Book, where <u>all</u> pedigree mares producing first foal are recorded, no restrictions at all placed on any mare);
- iii. Main body, pedigree stallion register for all colts that have passed the voluntary veterinary examination in accordance with the International Shetland Pony Committee, International Veterinary Standards, (one pedigree Stallion register only in the main body of the Stud-Book, where all stallions passing the Voluntary Veterinary Examination, are recorded, no restrictions at all placed on any stallion);
- iv. Main body, pedigree gelding register for all colts gelded and the owner has forwarded an authentic castration certificate completed by a veterinary surgeon to the office of the SPS-BS, (one pedigree gelding register only in the main body of the Stud-Book, where all geldings are recorded, no restrictions at all placed on any gelding).

Technical Activities

Herd Book services will be sourced from Grassroots Pedigree Software Solutions, PO Box 251, Exeter EX2 8WX, and include:

- The maintenance of a database containing the SPS-BS Stud-Book, including all foaling details;
- ii. Maintaining stud-book inventories; and
- iii. Provision of online inbreeding checker.

DNA testing services will be sourced from Weatherbys Scientific, Unit F1, M7 Business Park, Newhall, Naas, Co. Kildare, Ireland, W91 VX86.

Rules of procedure

The Society ensures the equal treatment of breeders participating in the breeding programme, no matter their country of origin.

How we will handle your complaint

- i. You will receive written acknowledgement of receipt by return post or email;
- ii. You will receive written confirmation by post or email within 15 days advising you how the complaint will be dealt with. In the first instance, any complaint which is received is circulated to the President and all of the Council members. If the complaint is against a Judge or the conduct of member, the Society would write to the individual to whom the complaint is concerning to obtain their account of events. Council would then decide how best to resolve the matter.
- iii. You will receive written confirmation of the outcome;
- iv. If you wish to appeal the decision this should be done in writing stating your grounds for the appeal and submitted to the next council meeting;
- v. Council will re-examine your complaint, taking into account the grounds for your appeal and advise you of the outcome in writing. You will receive written confirmation of the outcome and this decision will be final.
